BCO Bylaws Updates

For review and vote at the Open Meeting on Oct. 20.

The BCO Board of Directors has voted to propose the following changes to the <u>BCO bylaws</u>. Please review the intent and revised text for the proposed changes and be prepared to vote at the Open Meeting or vote by proxy. Note the *Intent and Rationale* are included here for your information only and will not be included in the bylaws text — only the **revised text** or **proposed text** as shown will be included).

PROPOSAL 1. Change terms of Board members from one year to two years.

Intent and Rationale: This change will increase continuity of board membership and leadership, which in turn will enable stronger momentum on projects. It will also reduce the volunteer effort required to seat a new board each year and improve outcomes in recruiting board members. **Note:** The only term limit remains with President limited to 2 consecutive terms. That limit has not been changed, which means a President can be elected for up to 2 (now two-year terms) consecutively.

Article VI OFFICERS, Section 2 ELECTION OF OFFICERS (page 6, revised text) A. Term

The Officers shall be elected at the Annual Meeting of the BCO and shall serve for **two years** until their respective successors have been elected.

PROPOSAL 2. Add a new bylaw Section that allows email voting on matters requiring immediate action.

Intent and Rationale: Officers must protect the integrity of their decisions by: 1) adhering to procedures and allowing for discussion upon any matter requiring a vote; and 2) ensuring that through active and meaningful participation, board members stay informed and comply with their fiduciary duty of care. Email can be a useful tool for taking the pulse of a board by polling board members. This new section formalizes email as a valid means for collecting input to inform an executive committee action. Per existing bylaws, the executive committee can take action on behalf of the board in between board meetings; the actual board decision is then documented via vote at the next in-person meeting.

Article VI OFFICERS Section 4 Email Voting (proposed text for NEW SECTION 4)

In a matter requiring immediate action, the President or a delegate will poll Board members via email and within 48 hours the members will respond with affirmation and/or concerns. After addressing any concerns, and upon receiving replies from a majority of Board members in the affirmative, the Executive Committee may go forward with action. This action will be reaffirmed at the next regularly scheduled Board meeting.

Waldorf School Also Serves Bowmanville

The Chicago Waldorf has 2 campuses— the main on Loyola Avenue in Rogers Park serves Pre-K through grade 12 and the Lincoln Square Annex serves Pre-K. For more information, visit chicagowaldorf.org.

Notably, Waldorf school was the second bidder in the Trumbull School redevelopment sale and had hoped to move their entire PK-12 school to the Trumbull campus near Bowmanville. They were outbid by Svigos Developers and TimeLine Theatre. The Svigos development plan is currently in a state of flux as TimeLine recently announced they pulled out of that plan.

BCO Amundsen Arts Thank You Campaign a Big Success

After Bowmanville residents and Amundsen high school's

art department teamed up to restore the Berwyn tunnel this summer, Bowmanville residents came to the board with a request to support Amundsen's Art Programs. The suggestion was a 'thank you' donation to help them buy needed supplies.

AHS art teachers Lorelei MacBeth and Denise Barba relayed to neighbors that with Chicago Public School's budget crisis their material needs are increasingly difficult for Amundsen to cover. Yet quality art supplies are crucial for a strong art program and to give the students experience with a great variety of


meeting is Tuesday October 11 at 6:30pm in the Amundsen Library (Enter the Main/center door on Damen).





Building Community Through Comfort Food

If you've walked or driven down Damen Ave. recently, you may have seen the sign "Sweet Virginia's Kitchen" on a storefront across from Amundsen High School just south of Foster Ave. It's a new restau-

rant that's slated to open in November by Angie Wines and her partner, Anneliese Moy, and that will feature homey eclectic food cooked from locally sourced ingredients.

Some of the treats to be showcased at Sweet Virginia's Kitchen

Sweet Virginia's Kitchen will offer a menu derived from Angie's years of cooking for friends and families, including her signature meats and smoked pulled pork, as well as dishes like chilaquiles, spicy Asian meatballs, and shrimp tacos with citrus slaw. Many of the items are time-tested hits from Angie's catering experience and annual tailgate party during

Chicago's Pride Parade.

"It's an eclectic menu featuring comfort food from all corners of the world," says Angie. "At the core, it's about making meals from scratch daily using ingredi-

ents from sources I trust. Knowing where our food comes from is really important for me because I come from a family of farmers."

The restaurant is named after Angie's grandmother, from whom she learned to cook. "I grew up standing next to her on a stool in the kitchen," Angie recalls. "She taught me all of our family recipes, both savory and sweet. For example, I rub whole pork shoulders with a secret recipe that's sweet and spicy. Using apple wood, I smoke it low and slow for 12 hours."

In addition to creating a neighborhood hub for comfort food, Angie will showcase and sell Anneliese's pottery in the restaurant. "Having artwork in the restaurant is also a nice reflection of my grandma, who created a lot of artwork herself, including drawings on her recipe cards, which will be displayed at the restaurant," Angie says. "We'll also be using Anneliese's beautiful hand-made pottery to serve some of the food."

The restaurant will be a family affair with Angie creating all the dishes while Anneliese managing the front of the house. "We are really looking forward to creating a community gathering place

through comfort food and art" Anneliese says. "We hope diners will feel the soul and effort Angie puts into each and every dish."

Even while getting her restaurant ready to open, Angie has already jumped in to support the community. 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A Greener, Sustainable Bowmanville

Making Bowmanville Monarch-Friendly

Monarch butterflies cannot survive without milkweed plants.

Their caterpillars eat only milkweed, so monarchs lay their eggs on the plants. But the increasing use of herbicides and changes in land use have eliminated much milkweed from the landscape, as this National Geographic article (August 20, 2014) points out. Therefore, planting milkweed can help support monarch populations, as well as other pollinators, because the plants provide nectar to a diverse array of bees and butterflies.

Fortunately, BCO members like David Johnston and B.A. Church know the importance of milkweed to monarchs and have some in the BCO Community Gardens. "We try to protect any milkweed that pops up," Dave says, "and B.A. Church has been actively planting it at Westgate Garden when available. There is often a wait list to purchase it at Gethsemane Gardens. I've also noticed that many neighbors are actively growing milkweed in parkways and yards. So thanks to all of you who are helping to make Bowmanville monarch-friendly."

Common milkweed spreads by underground rhizomes, so if you don't want it to take over an area, you may have to pull out or dig out the shoots in the spring. But that's usually quite easy to do, and worth the effort for all the good that milkweed does for monarchs and other butterflies — and us.

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The Little Blue Pet Haven on Berwyn

If your pet is a valued and integral part of your family, you know what it's like when your heart is touched by an animal. So you know how someone can feel when they are struggling to care for a companion animal that's touched their heart.

When Marijon Binder moved into a little blue house on Berwyn in 1978, many of her neighbors were elderly, their spouses dead and their children far away. With health issues and diminished finances, many were challenged to keep up their properties.



When visiting with them, Marijon would sometimes suggest that they sell their homes and move into senior or assisted living housing. Many said: "I will when my little dog or beloved cat dies, but not yet. I could not live with the realization that the pet who has been my faithful companion for so many years might end up being euthanized at Animal Control because of my weakness."

Marijon was a writer of curriculum materials and travelled a lot, but she was also a problem solver. So she began to say to her neighbors, "You find a better situation for yourself, and just bring your dog, cat or bird to me and I'll take care of it for the rest of its natural life. Once you are settled you can come to visit or I'll bring it to visit you."

Within a year the little blue house on Berwyn had one canine, one avian, and three feline residents, cared for by Marijon and a dedicated neighbor volunteer when she was away.

Helping Her Neighbors — and More

Then a dear lady from across the alley needed knee and hip surgery due to advanced arthritis but kept putting it off because she was the neighborhood stray cat feeder. So Marijon, totally naïve about the secret culture of stray/feral cats, suggested, "OK, let's capture, tame and find homes for *all* the outside cats in the neighborhood, starting with the kittens under your back steps."

What she learned over the next few months about the secret lives of alley cats — as well as about the kindness/concern and apathy/cruelty of humans — was astonishing. But, with the dedication of neighbors on a mission, all known stray/feral alley cats in Bowmanville were trapped, neutered and rehomed after graduating with family-cat manners from the transition house on Berwyn.

Early on, Marijon realized that to gain the concentration time and space for her writing career, it was necessary to "send the kids out to play". But even her fenced yard would not, of course, do for cats, so



she learned about standard lengths of 2x4's, 4x4's and screen types/sizes, and used her drafting skills to create the blueprint for a maximum-sized screened yard and engaged a neighbor to construct it. Easily visible from the extra-wide open

alley, it has been, over the years, a fun place for groups of youngsters and people pushed in wheelchairs to view feline antics (and for cats to view people!)

What had begun as a Bowmanville neighborhelping-neighbor endeavor, very quickly became a time-and cash-consuming project with social workers, family members, and elderly petitioners from all over Chicagoland calling for help with beloved pets. Often maintenance care (dog-walking, litter box changing, cleaning) or financial support (food, vet care) could be given in home, thus

keeping the person and pet together for mutual benefit and 5preventing another heartbreaking shelter surrender or before-its-time euthanasia.

One of the founding volunteers, Eleanor, having suffered strokes, heart attacks, cancer and arthritis, came to live with Marijon with her own menagerie of rescues and continued helping as she could, for 13 years. It was she who suggested the name, "Touched By An Animal," as illustrative of the lifeenhancing messages these beloved companion animals bring to their people, especially the elderly, disabled, and lonely.

A Very Specific Mission

In 1983 Marijon, with a newly- formed Board of Directors, applied for, and was granted not-for-profit status (502-c-3) and a state license – not as an animal shelter (which has a different mission of rescue/adoption), but as a haven for cats who may need temporary care until returning to their people. Of course, some may be rehomed when the person dies or moves away, or are rescued young felines.

Marijon does not advertise or publicize the haven's address, except for individually timed appointments, because this is still her personal home, not a business or a public animal shelter. PLEASE, do not bring cats to her house! Touched By An Animal is very limited in money and volunteers, and has this specific mission:

TOUCHED BY AN ANIMAL, INC, preserves the nurturing bond between people and their companion animals by helping the Elderly and others maintain this loving relationship and providing lifetime homes for cats when needed, in our home, where Cats-Are-Purrsons-Too.
