





In addition to seeing the 15 featured residential gardens, three BCO Community Gardens and the BCO GreenSpace, participants were able to get answers to gardening-related questions from a team of five Master Gardeners provided by the University of Illinois Extension Program.

Despite a morning shower and some light rain at times, groups of garden lovers roamed Bowmanville from 9:00 am until 4:30 pm, taking in the beauty of our neighborhood and its many lovely gardens. After the Walk ended, sponsors, volunteers, garden judges, and participating gardeners and photographers gathered for an awards party in the backyard of BCO Treasurer Craig Hanenburg that featured food from Sweet Virginia's Kitchen and

Truly a Blue-Ribbon Event

During the Walk, a Master Gardener review team consisting of Linda Blaser, Pat Morin and Pierre Poinsett reviewed six gardens for ribbon awards and provided consultations to four others. Jeff Graves and Suzanne Tenney guided the team through the neighborhood, and Diana Leifer hosted the Master Gardeners for lunch.

This year the was the first time that ALL of the gardens reviewed by the judges received Blue Ribbon Awards (90 to 100 points). Scoring is based on such criteria as design, creative use of plants, and neighborhood enhancement, using a 4-H type of system in which 100





Gateway Garden Plan Starts to Unfold

We are delighted to officially unveil the design plan for the community's feedback, a volunteer design committee met Gateway Garden Expansion! The drawing on the next page regularly, conducted site visits to other gardens, and condemonstrates what this community amenity, located along sulted with subject matter experts on best practices. In Ravenswood Avenue south of Balmoral and west of the April, the committee presented a preliminary plan to the Metra tracks, will bring to Bowmanville residents:

- 48 raised beds, including some taller beds accessible to people with physical limitations
- A pathway that weaves through the garden, complementing the West Andersonville pathway on the east side of the Metra tracks
- Community gathering spaces
- Sustainable waste management including recycling and an improved compost system
- Public art
- Pollinator plants and community picking areas
- Hoop house for an extended season growing
- Fencing around allotment beds


The plan culminates a community design process that began with a design charette last October. Working with the

community and gathered feedback. The site plan shown here reflects the results of this months-long collaborative process.

In arriving at the design, the committee balanced various aspirations with concerns for public safety, feasibility, and the physical "givens" of the space, such as available sunlight, drainage, and existing plantings.

The plan will be realized over a period of three years. This year, we're focusing on creating "full sun" growing areas on the east side of the parcel and building new and improved allotment beds in that area. In subsequent years, we'll integrate new community features and landscape areas, as budgetary and volunteer resources become available.

Baobab BBQ Comes to the Neighborhood

We have a new BBQ restaurant just outside BCO boundaries at 2301 W. Foster Avenue that's inspired by the South African Baobab tree, which provides nourishment for families and communities. BCO President Mona Yaeger sat down with Baobab's chef, South African Andrew Dunlop, to learn about his new place, his approach to BBQ and his choice of location.

Mona: Can you tell me a little about your background?

Chef: I started my restaurant career at the Swiss Hotel in South Africa and have been a chef now for over 25 years. I fell in love with working in the "back of the house" (kitchen) in a restaurant in a high-end hotel. From there, I went to Hilton International, where I worked for two years in London, Wales and other European countries. I was the Banquet Chef at Chicago's Drake Hotel (a Hilton property) in 1999 and then went back overseas to the Netherlands and Curaçao for a few years. I came back to Chicago in 2005 and worked for two years at the Four Seasons Hotel. After that, I worked until February of this year in the catering division of the LM restaurant group with friends of mine who own it.

Mona: Why did you decide to open your own place, and why in this neighborhood?

Chef: I've always wanted my own place. I loved what I did but having my own restaurant was where my career was leading me. I wanted my place to be family owned. I'm involving my kids in the process of setting up and opening the restaurant. They will also work in the restaurant during the summer and school breaks. I searched for a place for a year and this area seem to fit what is important to me — family and community.

Mona: What does the name Baobab mean (pronounced "bay-o-bab")?

Chef: Baobab is South African's iconic "tree of life" that has been providing subsistence to families and whole communities for thousands of years. I want to give back to the community that we will be serving our food to. I live close by and my kids go to school close by and play baseball in a nearby park. So, this felt right.



Mona: That's great, because that is one of the cool things about being here in Bowmanville, we are a great community and pride ourselves in giving back and supporting local businesses. What can we expect from Baobab BBQ?

Chef: We will be a counter-service, BYOB type of place. We will not have TVs because we want people to come in with their families, meet other people and dine. As part of giving back, I will establish a program in which at certain times I will take a percentage

of the profits and give that money to teachers in local schools to help with supplies, events or whatever is needed in the classroom. We will strive for consistency, so you will have same type of good service and high-quality food each time you come. We want longevity, and to be a fixture in the neighborhood — just like the Baobab tree in South Africa.

Welcome Our Lovely New Trees!

One of the best things about Bowmanville is its mature and varied tree canopy. Unfortunately, invasive species like the Emerald Ash Borer, as well as utility work and redevelopment construction, have taken a heavy toll on Bowmanville's parkway trees in the past decade.


On April 28, BCO planted 20 healthy new trees to "regreen" stretches of neighborhood parkway that had recently lost tree cover. The trees were provided free of charge through a generous grant from Openlands, and the planting was done in cooperation with a group of volunteer tree stewards from Openland's Treekeepers program. The Treekeepers educated us not only on how to properly plant the trees, but also on how to care for them and help them thrive in beautiful Bowmanville.

We planted burr oaks, swamp white oaks, shingle oaks, and redbuds. All of these species are disease-resistant and will remain hardy even as climate change puts stress on Chicago's urban forest.
